"How the world explorers of tomorrow will travel" – Exhibition at the Erwin Hymer Museum

The new exhibition "Beyond the Horizon" at the Erwin Hymer Museum shows what the future of travel could look like. Social trends such as the desire for "edutainment" and intensive travel experiences are the focus of the visions exhibited by budding transportation and mobility designers, automobile manufacturers and aerospace companies:

In the hydrogen-powered "Horizon Liner" luxury coach, the interior can be customized to match the focus of the exclusive tour booked. The model demonstrates how innovative technology can keep even the most sensitive passenger comfortable: Ball joints under the cabin and the seats can balance any incline or decline during the journey. For fans of fast sports cars and spending the night in the countryside, on the other hand, the vehicle of the "BAC Tectum" project is intended. Two 3D models show how an ultra-light, streamlined car becomes a tent with a solid floor that can be used to discover distant places. Other visions of the future on display make it possible to drive home from work surrounded by the underwater world, to travel around the world in the shortest possible time in an electric car without a charging station, or to drive and fly in one and the same vehicle.

Space as a travel destination is presented in large-scale displays of the visions of private space companies such as SpaceX or Blue Origin. They would like to take tourists into space in the near future. The spaceships, space hotels and rockets seem like science fiction, but are soon to become reality.

The detailed models and the numerous images and video footage immerse visitors in the world of tomorrow, inviting them to marvel but also to think and reflect on the apparent limitlessness of mobility in the future.

The Panorama of the Future is showing "Beyond the Horizon - How the World Explorers of Tomorrow Will Travel" until at least the end of the year. The Future Route is a regularly changing area in the exhibition at the Erwin Hymer Museum and is included in museum admission. Admission is free for children and young people up to the age of 18!
